Recology San Benito County is proud to work with residents in the Cities of Hollister, San Juan Bautista, and Unincorporated San Benito County to help meet state-mandated program requirements. Recycling is easier and more convenient than ever before!



RESIDENTIAL SERVICES INCLUDE

Organics Collection

A green cart for food scraps and yard trimmings.

Bulky Item Collection

Twice yearly, residents can arrange for curbside collection of bulky items and reusable materials **at no additional cost.**

Environmental Days

Six times per year, residents are invited to **drop off electronic waste for safe recycling, securely shred paper on-site, and pick up free compost** during this event in Hollister and San Juan Bautista.

Neighborhood Cleanup

Residents can request large bins for garbage, recyclables, and litter cleanup.

CURBSIDE SET-OUT

Please have your carts set out by 6am on your service day.

Lids are to remain closed at all times. Don't overfill.

GLASS BOTTLES AND JARS



PLASTICS #1-7

Bag shredded paper, or compost it loosely



CLEAN PAPER, SHREDDED PAPER AND ASEPTIC BOXES (E.G. MILK, JUICE)



METALS

Place small batteries in a clear zippered plastic bag on top of lid.

FOOD RECYCLING MADE EASY!

1. Collect food in newspaper, paper bags, or approved compostable bags. List available at www.bpiworld.org.
2. Take food collected to your cart or bin daily.
3. Use newspaper, shredded paper, or soiled napkins in between layers to absorb liquids, control pests, and reduce odor.
4. Keep lids closed at all times to minimize pests.

County Programs

HOUSEHOLD BATTERY RECYCLING

Place household batteries (AAA, AA, C, D, button type, cell phone, laptop) in a clear zippered plastic bag on top of the recyclables cart.



No automotive batteries! Those are typically accepted at auto parts stores.

USED MOTOR OIL AND FILTER RECYCLING

Contact Recology for one gallon containers and oil filter bags. One filter bag and either two 1-gallon used oil jugs or one 2.5-gallon used oil jug accepted at a time. Place next to your recyclables cart on your service day.



ELECTRONIC WASTE RECYCLING

Drop off unwanted electronics for proper disposal at John Smith Road Landfill, see map.

HOUSE HAZARDOUS WASTE (HHW) DISPOSAL

TREE RECYCLING

Residents can set out unflocked and undecorated trees the first three weeks in January. Trees must be cut into sections no greater than six feet.
