Recycling Rules of Thumb

It's Free & Easy!

Recycling in Oroville is free and easy. By recycling properly, you can save space in your garbage container and downgrade it, reducing your costs!

- 1. Keep all recyclables clean, empty, and dry.
- 2. Recycle rigid and hard plastics like water bottles, milk jugs, and detergent containers.
- 3. Items with chasing arrows are not always recyclable. When in doubt, check with Recology Butte Colusa Counties, visit

Common Recycling Mistakes

Don't Get Caught Wish-cycling

Make sure you and all your staff know which items can be recycled. The following items are frequently incorrectly placed into the recycling cart which can result in contamination fees.

- Film and sheet plastics like wrappers and bags, including "reusable" ones
- Paper coffee cups
- All Styrofoam
- Bubble wrap

We believe that good food belongs to people, not landfills; that technology can be used for good; and that people are wired to help - we just need to give them the opportunity.



When Life Gives You Scraps, Make Compost!

Putting organic waste in the green cart contributes to Recology's vision of a world without waste. Here's what happens to materials in the green cart:

- 1-4-
- Organic materials are taken to the Oroville Transfer Station.
- Recology transports compostables to our award-winning organics facility, Ostrom Road Organics in Wheatland.
- Materials are shredded and piled into long, damp mounds that reach 130–160-degrees.
 - Piles are aerated to speed up decomposition and enable microorganisms to break down materials.
 - Compost is inspected and sold to farmers and gardeners, beginning the cycle anew!

What Happens When I Recycle?

Wondering what happens once your blue can is collected?



 Recyclable materials are taken to the Oroville Transfer Station.



 Recology collects recyclables and takes them to material recovery facilities, or MRFs.



 Employees and machines work hard to separate materials and pick out landfill waste.



 Materials are baled and sold to manufacturers across the world!
